THE LOWDOWN

Saudi artist Lulwah Al Homoud has created colourful geometric designs based on the laws of proportion, practised in traditional Arabic calligraphy with principles of numerology. They may be traditional in concept but they are minimalist in form and resemble the illusionary and accessible style of op-art.

INSIDER'S TIP

Discover why Islamic geometry has remained relevant across centuries. The enduring symmetry and three-dimensionality means it can be constantly reinvented while sticking to traditional principles

A legendary US street artist and his achingly cool murals

THE LOWDOWN

Kenny Scharf moved to New York in 1978 and immediately became friends with prominent artists Keith Haring and Jean-Michel Basquiat. The trio embraced street art and were mentored by Andy Warhol on the pop-art aesthetic. Scharf's large scale fantastical mural-type paintings feature plastic toys, cartoons and imagined creatures, which celebrate and criticise the modern world.

INSIDER'S TIP

Although they seem loud, bright and fun, Scharf is also asking his audience to consider more serious issues such as environmental concerns and the excess of capitalism.

THE LOWDOWN

With six artists from the Indian subcontinent, Iran and Iraq, the very current issue of global migration and displacement is the focus of this exhibition. You will find blurred black and white photographs and drawings as well as a painting made of ashes. All are attempting to ask whether borders are confined and defined or, in reality, are they an uncertain and blurred line?

INSIDER'S TIP

The paper manuscript that divides the gallery is intended to be the unifier of the exhibition. It is written in Arabic, Urdu and Farsi and highlights the region's shared linguistic heritage.

A fantastical world behind a crochet curtain

THE LOWDOWN

The shapes that form most cities as well as how we connect and interact with each other in urban environments are the key themes of this exhibition by Iranian artist Nargess Hashemi. The gallery is full of handmade crochet curtains and drapes that hang from the ceiling to the floor and invite you to discover what's behind them.

INSIDER'S TIP

Notice the colour of the threads used in the crochet; the artist intends them to resemble nature. Think green for grass, blue for water and sky and black for shadowy space between buildings.

THE LOWDOWN

This exhibition's poetic title comes from a novel about a French journalist who was paralysed but managed to write a book using only his left eyelid. Whether you've read the book or not, the title is simply a literary device to unite artists who find creative freedom in a restrictive system.

INSIDER'S TIP

Keep an eye out for the work of Julia Ibbini. Using only paper and a laser cutter plus a good dose of mathematics, her art pieces are mesmerising and beautiful.

The show brings together art in many mediums. Watch out for Nasir Nasrallah's Atlas of Imaginary Places: cartoon-like illustrations of a fictional and mythical realm.

A solo exhibition by one of the UAE's most important artists

Mohammed Ahmed Ibrahim lives in Khorfakkan on the east coast and for the past three decades he's been producing his unique form of art, consisting of brightly coloured and oddly shaped sculptures as well as paintings made of signs and symbols. He also collects the mountain rocks from his local vicinity and wraps them in wire – as a way of trying to capture the soul of the UAE's natural habitat.

INSIDER'S TIP

Take your kids along to this one. Although art exhibitions can be a bit daunting for the whole family, this one is full of colours and shapes and is a lot of fun. Don't miss the entire building covered from ceiling to floor in his black and white marks and symbols.

A multimedia display of funk music fusion from across the Arab world

Habibi Funk is a record label founded by a Berlin-based DJ called Jannis Stuertz. It is dedicated to re-releasing the music of funk artists from Cairo to Casablanca and across the Arab world. This exhibition comprises photography, video and music, which aims to revitalise Arabic musical history of the 1970s and 1980s with a focus on the obscure and forgotten performers of the region.
